MINISTER'S REFLECTIONS

Dear Friends,

I have been part of the community at Gracious Street for seven months. My overriding expression is of humbleness and gratitude. I give thanks for the ministry of Gail and David that has enriched the church. I am also thankful for each person who is part of Gracious Street. It is self-evident with all that happens at Gracious Street that many people have given up their time and money to ensure we are a flourishing Christian community. This is reflected in a statement that has emerged from the Leadership Team: "Your church for your whole week." We are a community that is open and vibrant each day of the week. Yet the word that is most significant to me is "your" because Gracious Street is not my church but our church; though theologically speaking Gracious Street is actually God's church.

Whilst we are a community that is connected to God and one another we are also connected with our past. John Wesley, founder of Methodism, wrote in a pamphlet: "A Methodist is one who has the love of God shed abroad in his heart......and they accordingly love their neighbour as themselves: they love every person as their own soul. Their heart is full of love to all mankind." Whilst this is a Methodist character this is also the character of a Christian.

It was the pursuit of this characteristic that gathered people together in order to grow in love and then go back into the world. These early Methodists were an influence in prison reform, abolition of slavery and caring for the most vulnerable in society. In more recent years this activity of gathering and going has been phrased through the language of "A discipleship movement shaped for mission." We are not to be static but a movement, something fluid, that changes shape in order to help us grow in love and live love in the world.

Over the years Gracious Street has made significant changes that have enabled the community to flourish. One of these changes was the development of The Bridge. It opened ten years ago and has been a great success. While we need to celebrate a decade of success we also need to consider how The Bridge can continue to be successful in the years to come.

At the same time there are a number of people who have given of themselves but now wish to stand down from their current roles. So I am aware there are a number of roles that are or will become vacant within a short period of time.

For these and other reasons the church has invariably been in a time of reflection where we are considering the life of Gracious Street. In this reflection we need to remember the character of a

Christian to ensure we stay true to God's mission and consider how we live this character in a way that continues to be relevant for today. The outcome of this reflection will come from discerning the spirit of God within the church because we are in it together.

I would like to end on a personal note. My family and I love life in Knaresborough. We are also delighted to be part of Gracious Street and the wider Nidd Valley Circuit. We thank you for your welcome. It has been gratefully received.

CONSULATION ON WORSHIP

Worship is essential. It creates space to experience God's love and respond to God. It can also motivate and inspire us to serve God in the world. It is equally self-evident that worship is significant at Gracious Street. Both the morning and evening services continue to be well-attended, including All Together Worship and Connect.

In recognition of the significance of worship I do apologise that I have not held a formal opportunity to consult on the worship of Gracious Street. May I reassure you that it is my intention to continue the practice of worship consultation. Nevertheless there have been conversations with musicians, worship leaders, local preachers and supernumeraries. What follows is a summary of these conversations.

We are committed to maintaining a blend of contemporary and traditional songs that creates a rich experience of worship. There is a recognition of the benefit of a group of singers leading the less familiar songs. Gracious Street is privileged with the depth of musicians and we have a desire to include people of varying ages and skills to be involved in the music. It has been expressed amongst the musicians that we need to consider succession planning.

We are equally blessed with those who have responded to the call to be worship leaders and Sue Whalley's journey to become a local preacher. Each one continues to enrich the life of the church. Those who are training to be worship leaders and local preachers have expressed some challenges with the new courses but these challenges are in the process of being resolved.

There has also been a recognition that those who operate the projector are equally involved in leading worship. This is a ministry in itself that enriches our worship.

If you have a desire to be involved in any way with our worship, please do speak to me or any of the worship stewards. Your willingness would be most welcome.

Some people have also articulated a desire for worship to focus on contemporary issues in order to help us think about our Christian journey in the world. At the same time the Imagine Project has been discussed as a means to help us think about our Christian journey in the world. This project originated from the London Institute of Contemporary Christianity and they have partnered with the Methodist Church.

We also have a Prayer Chain where prayers are circulated by telephone or email amongst those signed up to the Prayer Chain. If this is something in which you would like to participate or if you have a need for prayer, then please contact Alan Middleton or Joyce Hoare.

At the same time you will also find some prayer request cards in The Bridge. Please place your prayer request in the box outside the minister's office in The Bridge. These requests are then included into the prayers during our services. If you would rather not use the cards, requests may also be entered directly in the Prayer Book before worship on Sundays. Alternatively you may prefer someone to pray with you. There are a number of volunteers in The Bridge whom you can ask, or join in with Pause for Thought.

Rachel Watson has been working diligently in updating Gracious Street's Prayer Diary. This has been delayed due to requirements under the General Data Protection Register but will be available shortly. At the same time there is also the Methodist Prayer Handbook. This is a resource that offers prayers for the world and is a resource shared with people from all round the world.

MUSIC IN WORSHIP

We continue to appreciate the input of Malcolm, Gordon, Brian and Mike as the main keyboard players for morning and evening services. Worship Group and Family Band have also enriched our worship especially for major celebrations and when a confident lead with new songs has been needed.

Worship Group meets weekly on Tuesdays at 8pm and includes an important element of prayer, Bible reading, song lyrics discussions etc rather than just learning new songs. The main focus of our ministry is to lead the church in sung worship when contemporary songs have been chosen. We have a particularly important role in Connect services (the last Sunday evening of each month.)

Family Band has focused mainly on playing at All Together Worship and special festivals; it is encouraging to hear how they have developed their skills over the year.

Looking forward:

We intend to continue using a variety of hymns/songs ranging from traditional to contemporary. We would like to introduce more recent contemporary songs (which tend to be sung in Connect services) to our morning congregation.

As far as instrumentalists are concerned, we are hoping to introduce the next generation of pianists to playing for part of the services – e.g. during the offertory, before or after a service. Also, over time, perhaps we can build up a large enough pool of instrumentalists to form a number of smaller bands so that the responsibility can be more widely spread.

We recognise the importance of getting more young instrumentalists involved in Family Band. Our youngest players are now at secondary school and progressing rapidly.

We could explore the possibility of having a core group of contemporary songs to draw on for a certain period e.g. two to three months. This would help the congregation to learn these songs more thoroughly and instrumentalists would only need to learn new songs at the beginning of the period.

LEARNING AND CARING

The Church exists to help people to grow and learn as Christians, through mutual support and care.

PASTORAL

No organisation, nor church, is more important than each individual. We are all equally important. In response Gracious Street aspires to be a community that welcomes and cares for all people.

While the minister will respond to pastoral needs, the church recognises it is the ministry of the whole people of God. For this reason pastoral care is also provided through a number of ways, such as pastoral visitors, home groups and the flower team. We also have a team supporting those who are housebound or in care homes. While they may be unable to attend services, they remain a vital part of our church. At the same time pastoral care is each person's responsibility. So we are to be a community that supports one another.

The pastoral committee meets with a specific focus of reviewing the pastoral needs of those in our community, appointing pastoral leaders and encouraging the practice of fellowship through home groups and other groups in our church.

Due to personal reasons Nita Ayrton has decided to step down from her role as pastoral secretary. We are grateful for all Nita has done on the committee. At the same time our prayers and support are with her. Currently the role of pastoral secretary is vacant.

The last time the committee met there was a fruitful discussion about the effectiveness of our pastoral care. One aspect the committee would like to develop is being a safe space where we can have confidence to be vulnerable with one another; to be honest about our struggles and doubts in regard to life and faith. The meeting also reinforced that we are a caring community but the size and structure of Gracious Street can create challenges. It was agreed that a small group will be formed to look at, explore and develop pastoral care. This is still on-going.

The church membership figures as of 31st October 2018 (the period in which Methodist church membership figures are collated) was 187 members and over (adults and children) on the community pastoral roll.

It is with great sadness I report that several people in our community have died this year. At the same time people within our community have suffered the loss of loved ones. Their death is a great loss to us all but we maintain our hope in Christ. Our prayers are with those in our community, as well as the friends and families of those who have lost loved ones.

SAFEGUARDING

The Methodist Church approved and updated the Safeguarding Policy in May 2018. Certain sections are subject to amendment in line with changes in law and in the Methodist Policy. The document will be 'updated' as and when such changes take place.

The Safeguarding Policy is a thorough and lengthy document bringing about some changes to safeguarding children and vulnerable adults within the Methodist Church. The Policy is available 'on-line' on the Methodist Church website. One paper copy of the policy will be kept in Gracious

Street Office for 'reference' only.

There will be further Foundation and Refresher Courses held during this year – dates to be arranged.

There is a NEW Advanced Safeguarding Course specially designed for all Local Preachers and Worship Leaders. The Advanced Module includes 'Essential Preparation' and a list of attendees has been drawn up and invites will be sent in due course. There will be a venue available locally due to the volume of people needing to attend in Harrogate.

We are looking to recruit Safeguarding Officers at Gracious Street. If you think you might like to join the team, then please get in touch with Rev Gordon Hay or Val Coapes for further details.

Please can you contact me when you have a new volunteer join your group so we can carry out the necessary training and complete the checks required as soon as possible. I thank you all for your co-operation.

COGS CREATIVE WRITERS

The Creative Writers continue to meet roughly bi-monthly to share, review and work on new projects, both personal and corporate.

There are so many styles involved: songwriting, muses, getting under the skin of Bible characters in monologue, haiku, humour and pathos, amongst others.

We enjoy writing for specific events or worship services too.

We are inspired by each other, our faith, our world – both nature, and aspects of current affairs; war and suffering, courage and determination, and the power of love and reconciliation.

After the success of the Advent book in 2017, last year we began compiling a Lent book, CONSIDER JESUS, which was released in February this year. The book follows events in the gospels and aspects of faith and life; it includes prayers and Bible references and Sunday reflections by various ministers, for which we are grateful. Material from the Lent book was also worked into two Connect services.

Some of us are studying Worship Leaders and Local Preachers courses and find scope and help here in our ability to write as an aid to worship. The writers also took part in the launch of Hilary's latest book, GASP, in January.

Writing can be good therapy, and help us clarify our thinking. It is also a gift to share and we have been privileged to do this. Our work always benefits from being read aloud and we seek opportunities for this to happen.

We are always open to a challenge and are seldom short of ideas; time is important in all this, sometimes creative juices flow freely and easily, other times we yearn for the space to write; always we are thankful for the gift we have been given by God and continue to look for ways of serving Him and the world by what and how we write.

Gail and David were very encouraging in both using or quoting our work and commissioning new material. Gordon is also very aware of the creativity within the church and is eager to tap into it; we really appreciate this.

Encouragement is extremely important, so if you have enjoyed our work, or found a particular poem or prayer helpful, then please do let us know; thanks to all friends at Gracious St for the support you show. We do not consider ourselves holy or special in regards to our work, but we do recognise that each is unique in our Christian journey, our age, our stage of life, our successes and failures, indeed as we all are. And we seek to reflect that. We are ALL special to God.

SUNDAY CLUB

Sunday Club (ages 3-10) and TOGS (ages 11+) meet during the Sunday morning service every week, apart from the second Sunday. Both groups are spaces where children can learn about God and develop their own faith in an age appropriate way. They are also an opportunity for adults to learn and be challenged by the children – young people tend to ask very honest questions!

Typically, the sessions begin with a time of welcome and sharing, then talking about/responding to a Bible story together. Activities include games, crafts, music, YouTube videos and role play – as well as times to be quiet (sometimes!). Just as adults have preferred styles of worship, so too do younger people; after a time of sharing ideas together, we try to provide a choice of things for the children to do. We display the art work and posters from our sessions on the Sunday Club notice board outside the Manor Room.

Recently it has been good to have input from Jaynie Kendall, our new children's development worker. With her help, our future plans include training for leaders, as we seek to stay relevant and fresh. We have been encouraged that the children feel comfortable bringing friends along to the sessions and we would like to develop our outreach through a Facebook page/special events.

The groups are run by a fantastic team of leaders and helpers; many thanks to them. More help is always welcome, so please get in touch if you would like to be involved.

MESSY CHURCH

In January we celebrated the first birthday of Messy Church. We took the theme of 'celebration' and looked at the story of the wedding in Cana so in the craft session we enjoyed making party clothes out of bin bags, party hats, bracelets to wear and we decorated wine glasses so that we could sample the water that turned into wine! As always we had a celebration in church with songs, the Bible story and a prayer before enjoying a party tea.

The first year of Messy Church has been very positive and enjoyable. We have a great team of twenty leaders and I would like to thank them all for everything they do. Our average attendance at Messy Church is sixty plus the leaders, so there are usually about seventy-five people in church on a Messy Church Saturday. There are about twenty families who come very regularly so there is a real sense of community building up and relationships being formed.

As we look to the future, we plan to start a Messy Church Facebook page to help build community and to aid communication including linking Messy Church in with things that are happening in the wider church. We are looking at ways in which we can help any adults at Messy Church to explore the Christian faith further. We are planning to have an Easter celebration on the Saturday before Easter Sunday. Messy Church families will be encouraged to invite friends to come along and we would also like to invite anyone from Gracious Street to join us.

We continue to build relationships and to make sure that Messy Church is truly for all ages so that we can share God's love with all who come. We are excited about where God is leading us and we would be very grateful for your continued prayer support.

YOUTH GROUP

We have just re-started our Youth Group at Gracious Street after a two or three year gap. This is such a vital part of our church jigsaw: a piece that has been missing recently and had made a real gap in our purpose.

Our first meeting was in late January. We are meeting on alternate Monday evenings in term time, upstairs at Gracious Street, which is such a fabulous space for young people to be. The sessions include computer games, table football, a group game, a tuck shop, craft activities and chat-time about a topical subject.

The group is open to all young people in school years 7 to 11 inclusive. We want to be as welcoming as possible and, whilst we will discuss topics with a faith perspective, we wish always to be somewhere that a young person with no church background could turn up at and feel that they belong.

It is early days as I write this: we have only met three times. We already have a core group of young people who seem to enjoy and value it already, which is great. Almost equally good news at this point is that we have assembled a great team of 7 leaders, which will enable us to run the group without the burden getting too heavy on any one person.

NOAH'S ARK PRE-SCHOOL

We have thirty-nine children on the register now. Some twenty-two will leave us this July as their education continues elsewhere. We have thirty-three children already on our waiting list for the next academic year. From September 2019 fees will be £5.30 per session.

All our staff are being given the Methodist Advanced Safeguarding Training led by Laura Gallery the district Safeguarding Officer.

We continue to build links with all sections of our Church at Gracious Street and with the wider community. This is work we are to share. We are grateful for all those who work with us, in a variety of ways, to care and nurture the children among us.

PLAYBOX

Playbox Toddler Group continues to meet every Friday morning during term-time in the church hall. The aim of Playbox is to provide parents, carers and grandparents with a place to meet new people and have fun with the children, have a coffee, share problems and provide a Christian outreach into the community. This year Playbox celebrates its 30th birthday; we will have our usual party on the nearest Friday morning in May and plan to hold a fundraising celebration with Noah's Ark one Saturday later in the year.

ALL WE CAN

THE BRIDGE COFFEE BAR

Recently sixth formers from Springwater School have been helping us on Thursdays.

All usual activities continue – Book Clubs, Piano Bar, Chatty Crafts, Pause for Thought, Charity stalls, Fair Trade - and the Bridge is an outreach into our community in so many ways. We continue the Family Eating and play space on Fridays in the Priory room. The monthly Drop-in by the Safer Neighbourhood Police Team also continues whenever possible. There are now many regulars – some of them groups - who come along and it is good to get to know and welcome them. We welcome the 'Walking for Health' walking group on Thursdays – short easy strolls on the level. The 'Silver Bowlers' – an indoor bowls group which takes place on Mondays 11-12 – has grown in numbers.

Our aim is to build more links into the community, explore more faith sharing ideas and build on what we have. We do still need some more volunteers on the rota – to be 'listeners', help serve on non-college days and generally become involved with new ideas, enthusiasm and encouragement for the on-going work. LEADERSHIP, PROPERTY & FINANCE

MANAGEMENT TEAM

The role of the management team is to ensure that the building is operated and run for the benefit of all users. This includes taking care of the property (including the cottages), Health and Safety, keeping an eye on finance and managing enquiries and bookings. We work closely with the Bridge team and worship stewards, represented on the management team by Sue Whalley and Jeanette Mowat respectively.

In the year since the last AGM we have had to deal with a major refurbishment of the heating system, including re-configuring the boilers; we have also done a major refurbishment of the toilets off the Castle Room. Major work was completed in 4 Chapel Street to rectify damp issues and make good the decoration in readiness for new tenants. Eleanor Borkett does a brilliant job organising tradesmen and contractors to carry out these repairs.

Other main activities completed this year were an annual "deep" clean during the summer, including some redecoration, as well as general repairs, including the roof. We administer annual maintenance contracts for the heating, the lift, fire alarm and extinguishers and the burglar alarm. The problems with the heating system serve as a reminder that our "new" building is approaching ten years old and we can expect increasing issues as various items of equipment wear out and require replacement.

We have completed risk assessments for all our internal groups – many thanks to David Simpson for leading on this activity. We have reviewed our evacuation procedure and will be training office holders in the procedure in the coming weeks.

In all our discussions we are particularly focused on making sure that the first contact we have with users, the welcome they receive on arrival and the condition and upkeep of our premises demonstrate our Christian values. In short we want people to see the Church in action. Please help us to this end by reporting any concerns to us (don't assume someone else will do it!) so that they can be dealt with promptly and by working together to maintain the building to a high standard.

As well as our regular users we have a steady stream of enquiries from a variety of bodies including hosting course for Tees, Esk & Wear Valley NHS Trust, North Yorkshire CC, Age UK, UBU and in particular this year we have hosted Harrogate Adult Education classes. We also have a steady stream of children's parties.

We would also be pleased to welcome one or two more people onto the team to help spread the workload. If you feel you have the skills and enthusiasm for this work, please have a word with one of us.

The work of the Management Team is often only noticed when something goes wrong; this belies the huge amount of work that goes on behind the scenes. I would like to record my thanks to the Management Team for all their hard work once again this year.

FINANCE REPORT

Our finances have reduced substantially since the last AGM due to major refurbishment & repairs to the heating system over the Summer and Autumn (£9,500) and refurbishment of the Castle Room toilets (£3.500). We have also seen significant increases in our circuit assessment in recent years, with 2018/19 increased by almost £8,000.

Our current funds as at 27th February 2019 are as follows:

I am delighted to say that during the year we have received a grant from the Schofield Foundation of £10,000, to be held as a restricted fund, for the education of Johnny Huy (Lam's son in Vietnam). This is included in the above summary, therefore our net available funds are £44,501.

Based on our finances so far this year, ignoring the items of extraordinary income or expenditure and taking into account our anticipated gift aid income, our expenditure exceeds our income by


approximately £350 per month. The charts below give a summary of income and expenditure. We hold in tension the needs of our internal running costs against the need to be outward looking. This year to date we have made donations and collections totalling just over £9,400.


We will continue to face the challenge of an increasing circuit assessment as we will probably continue to be the Church with the largest income. It is our circuit assessment which funds the ministers, their accommodation and other circuit staff, as well as paying for the services provided by the District. It is therefore vital that we are able to pay our assessment in order to receive the benefits of a minister and other circuit and district services. Alongside our assessment we also need to fund our mission in the community and continue to provide opportunities to bring new people to Christ. We therefore need to remain diligent in our giving and fundraising activities.

Many of our Church community give generously not only financially, but also of their time and talents to support a range of fundraising and missional activities. We do however need to engage the whole Church community in our mission and its financing. I feel that we need to have a concerted effort to increase our income over the coming months whilst bearing down on our expenditure. One of the ways that we can do this is to ensure that if you are a UK tax payer, you gift aid any donation you make to the Church. Ed Walton our Gift Aid secretary or myself would be pleased to advise you in this regard. The leadership team & I would like the Church community to come forward with fundraising ideas that could help to boost our income. Any ideas can be explored - any idea is better than none at all.

I would once again like to take this opportunity to thank all those involved in looking after the Church finances; Geoff Rogers who administers the regular giving scheme via the envelope system; Ed Walton has now replaced Paul Blanch as gift aid secretary; Alan Middleton who looks after the Bridge takings and all those who count and bank the money week by week.
