# Church Council Report March 2020 - 2021

# **Leadership**

Leadership Team have continued to meet bi-monthly - remotely - over the last 12 months.

We have welcomed Nick Garrett onto Leadership Team, as Sue Whalley has stepped down. We are deeply thankful for Sue's ministry on LT and we know that Nick will also have a lot of great ideas to offer.

Key topics of discussion have included:

Lockdown Church: LT has discussed and reflected through the multiple transitional periods of how GS continues to be a church community through the pandemic. These discussions include the offering of digital services, the distribution of paper handout services and the reopening of the building for physical, socially-distanced services, as well as different ministerial initiatives. There has also been discussions around developing missional online content that can be pushed out to the wider Knaresborough community. In addition, there have been discussions around numerous initiatives to keep us connected, such as Calls at 11am; connexion on Facebook, home groups continuing to meet virtually etc. Special activities were prepared for times such as Advent & Christmas: eg Carols by Candlelight online and Christmas Day drop-in. Whilst we are sure that there are things we could have done better, we feel that GS has responded well to this time of challenge, with online music and videos being a particular new skillset that has been developed: we have a lot of gifted folk at GS! If anything, lockdown appears to have brought many people on the fringes of our church closer in; it's been a time when we have all felt a real yearning to be part of a community.

Resurrected Bites: LT agreed in the early stages of lockdown to allow Resurrected Bites to use The Castle Room, from which it continues to operate. Again, this has been a fantastic local community service, as well as a great witness for GS during this time. We have a strong relationship with the Resurrected Bites team. As we transition out of lockdown, the longer term location of RB will need to be agreed; we are currently considering a community store.

Community Development Worker: At the time of the initial lockdown, discussions were well underway towards the possible appointment of a Community Development Worker. These have been put on hold for now; however, we will need as a church to consider what The Bridge and the GS building more broadly will look like and be used for in our "new normal" future.

Children & Young People: These groups have been very much on our hearts and minds over the last 12 months. Initiatives to assist with home learning were developed; Messy Church ran for a time whilst allowed within the Tier rules; Youth Group ran online for a time; and videos have been produced for online Who Let the Dads Out activities. Again, the challenge of how we engage children and young people in the future is very much an open question.

Our "New Normal" Future: The future remains uncertain - how quickly will we return to "normal"? Will there be further periods of lockdown? What will be different in the future? Is this a time to re-imagine our church? What is it time to let go of, or hold on to, or develop afresh? To what extent do we wish to continue to be an online connexion? These are all questions which LT will continue to consider.

Story Board: LT have had conversation around a GS Storyboard that will offer a narrative to guide us through the transition and beyond.

# Service & Evangelism

## Noah's Ark Pre-school

What a year! As with schools, we closed on Friday 20th March 2020 due to the Coronavirus pandemic. Other than the occasional "snow day", we have operated consistently since 1993 so it came as a shock to suddenly be without our children. We offered originally to stay open for the children of critical workers, but parents managed to look after their children at home.

So, what to do? We seized the opportunity to embark upon "The Curiosity Approach" Accreditation, a 12-month programme to improve what we provide for our children in terms of environment and learning opportunities. Like everyone else it seems, we met on Zoom, we shared ideas on WhatsApp, became closer as a team and generally got giddy and excited about reopening a new and improved Noah's Ark. We were bombarded with an endless stream of guidance from the government and were finally able to re-open on 1st June to limited numbers of children and a pared back setting. Suddenly the term "bubbles" entered our vocabulary along with "PPE" and "quarantine" as we scrubbed and disinfected between our two groups of children. There was no trip or party this year, but we managed to say goodbye to our school leavers in the garden, with parents socially distanced of course.

In the summer holidays the staff finally managed to get together with a "Bargain Hunt" £20 challenge at a car boot sale to pick up new, curious resources. Then the great clear out began; out went the plastic toys and bright coloured carpets, the tables & chairs were stored away, and we introduced more recycled and natural materials.

The Autumn term saw us reopening to all our children and deciding to have just one "bubble". We were worried how the children's transitions would be as parents were not allowed in the building and we had not had the usual home visits to build relationships with them. Actually, it was better than usual, many of them literally skipping in! We are amazed at how resilient some of our little people are.

The staff continued to scrub and disinfect their way through till Christmas, only closing once for everyone to self-isolate due to a positive case of the virus. We couldn't have our usual Under 5's Crib Service that is so popular with parents, but the children dressed up and reenacted the Christmas story in their own way in our outdoor stable. Children say the funniest things, and we were able to share our version of events with parents as a PowerPoint, though I doubt if the Wise Men really brought Baby Jesus a coffee machine!

Since January, when schools closed to most children, we have had to stay open but have reduced our opening hours. We have still accommodated all the children whose parents wanted them to attend during Lockdown 3 and the staff have had more chance to scrub and disinfect and to rest.

With almost 25% of our children having additional needs, several with English as their second language and a very young cohort, we have had a challenging year, but with a strong,

experienced, and mature team of early years professionals, we feel that we are all the better for it.

As March rolls around again, we are back to our normal hours, booking places for September, taking enquiries from prospective parents, and looking forward to a brighter future.

#### Resurrected Bites

Resurrected Bites was originally set up in January 2018 to raise awareness of food waste by intercepting food, still good quality, from supermarkets, shops and cafes that otherwise would have gone to waste.

Initially food was served in "pay as you feel able "cafes and community shops at St Marks and Gracious Street allowing all access to healthy meals and fresh produce.

When the pandemic arrived in March 2020 the cafes had to close and the work was transitioned into a home delivery service for people in food poverty.

For several months Gracious Street has been the centre for storage of food and basic supplies, preparing home cooked meals and food distribution.

Food was initially obtained from local shops, supermarkets, cafe and also FareShare a national network which sources surplus food from the food industry.

During last year with the effects of lock down there was a marked increase in the number of people in food poverty, an appeal for donations of food and other basic supplies was made to people in our communities and Churches, local people have been very generous with lots of donations and there are now local drop off points where food and other goods can be donated.

People needing help from Res Bites complete an order form allowing us to supply (where possible) not just food, including home cooked meals, but also all essential for daily living plus "extras" like fresh flowers if we have them.

On the form there is also a question asking if people would like to be connected with people in their local church for regular telephone calls or prayer.

If people are in need of clothes we can also provide these from the Harrogate Clouting bank.

At Christmas members of Gracious Street Church contributed by donating food and presents through the "reverse Advent Calendar" and these allowed presents to be delivered to many people. A nice gesture to parents was to provide them with wrapping to allow them to "wrap their own children's presents".

Res Bites has also indirectly helped other organisations eg providing food and water to Inspire Youth for their outreach work, giving excess food to Pudsey Foodbank, and taking surplus flowers to local nursing homes.

These are a few figures up to February 22nd

Approx 2.5 tonnes of food going to waste intercepted per week 4321 orders processed helping the "equivalent" of 6842 adults and 5281 children term equivalent used as many people get help weekly, biweekly or monthly so the same person is counted as many times as they have ordered. currently 85 volunteers

### Playbox

When Playbox sessions stopped in March last year, we thought it would be for a few weeks and agreed to keep in touch through WhatsApp, and we already had a Facebook page so we could support each other and arrange dates to meet up again, but as we know it didn't quite work like that.

We met informally at the Castle grounds during July August and September, each family bringing their own blanket and snacks, and we made a flag, so everyone knew we were a toddler group and not just friends breaking the rules. But by October it was getting too cold, so Jeanette helped Sheila and Vicki write a risk assessment and Gordon supported us with the practical changes and we were able to meet for 3 weeks in December as a group. We met in the church, with chairs 2 metres apart, we only used a limited number of the easily wiped toys, we danced to a cd rather than singing and had a cleaning stations for equipment and children dotted around the room. It was different, but it was lovely to see the children playing together and the parents chatting again. Several families felt they were unable to come and we have kept in touch with them. As well as using social media, Sheila and Vicki have delivered letters to our families, Christmas cards and presents and a knitted dove of hope from Wesley Chapel.

#### Who Let The Dads Out

Until March 2020, WLTDO met monthly on a Saturday morning, a dynamic and growing group of Dads with pre-school children. They met for play, snacks and chat; a place to nurture family bonds and develop relationships. Like everything else, last year this had to move online. Mostly, this was on the WLTDO Facebook page.

I posted regular videos, firstly of Bible stories, retold using toy props and then later a series of 10 five-minute 'Boredom Buster 'videos, full of craft and play ideas. The focus was on helping families enjoy time together and using things available around the home.

In addition, during the summer holidays and with the support of Knaresborough Connectors, we organised a town number trail. Vicky Taylor, June Graham and I put up a number trail with over 100 knitted lamppost scares, number pictures and bunting. (Many thanks to all the church members who helped with the knitting!) The aim of this was to encourage counting, number recognition and conversation amongst families in readiness for the return to school.

The benefit of being online has been the ability to reach large numbers; some of the videos have been watched by over 1000 people. There's been positive feedback about how beneficial families have found both the videos and the number trail. However, developing relationships with the families has been much harder; this has been limited to sending emails to our 'regulars' (many of the dads only came occasionally and didn't leave contact details) and bumping into people around the town.

As it's a group for those with pre-school children, we'll be needing to advertise and welcome in new families when we eventually meet again physically, However, this last year has shown us all the importance of meeting together and the value of supportive chat. I'm sure that WLTDO will be hugely appreciated when it is able to return.

#### Film

Through the approval of the Leadership Team a small group has been developed to create missional media content to push out to the wider Knaresborough community. With permission from the borough council, the county council, and several helpful people (including the schools and allotment owners), we were able to put them up on roads where people walked into town. Several people in our

church and St John's helped with the knitting and I like to think they brightened up the town for a few weeks and hopefully helped a few children feel more confident about maths before returning to school.

## Easter Club & Easter Hunt

Last year we were planning for another amazing Easter club and then lockdown happened. It quickly became apparent that home learning was going to be challenge to a number of families in Knaresborough. This was initially driven by Miranda Rawson but many people within Gracious Street came on board to develop a Home Learning initiative. We advertised throughout Knaresborough that families could get in touch with Gracious Street and someone from the community will support the family through online communications to assist primary children with maths and English work. While there was a positive response, with people's appreciation, very few people took up the offer. Though we advertised the initiative in a positive way we began to wonder whether personal stigma and technological challenges were prohibitors to people taking up the offer.

### GS Youth Club

While this is a cause of concern, Gracious Street is looking into a more intergenerational approach where families with young people can belong.

#### All We Can

During the past year we have continued to support the vital work of All We Can as a Partner Church. The focus for the Partner Church scheme has been "Change Begins with a Bicycle" where in Butagaya, Uganda the community faces long distances to reach education, healthcare and marketplaces.

We have been fortunate over the last year to have both Tim Baker and Peter Blanch from All We Can take part in our online services. We look forward to the time when they can take part in worship in our church building.

All We Can produces some excellent resources and we used some of them in our online Harvest service. Currently some of our congregation are following their "Changes Begins" booklet as part of their personal Lent devotions.

In the period September 2019 to August 2020 we gave £3,971.40 to All We Can and received a certificate and letter from their Chief Executive thanking Gracious Street Methodist Church for our support.

## **Creative Writers**

For the CCW writers at Gracious Street, the pandemic was a trigger which set off much creativity within and beyond the group. Writing became our prayer, our voice of defiance, frustration, lament and encouragement. Individuals expressed all of this and more with a humility born out of lack – lack of contact, physical touch, lack of fellowship, and lack of connection.

We learned we cannot 'fix 'things; that we can and should depend on each other more, and that writing itself is a powerful vehicle of hope, unity and prophecy. Whilst we might have thought we've been 'deprived', our minds have been rightly disturbed at the true poverty in our world, at our apathy and greed and perhaps accelerated our response to environmental and equality issues. Whilst not being afraid of expressing doubt or uncertainty at times, haven't we learned (a little) through this pandemic what it truly means to walk in God's way? Considering how we should lean on Him has been part of the adventure, as faith has been both challenged and inspired. This has been a positive aspect of living a new life and thriving as a church community.

As Spring unfolded with the pandemic, we appreciated Nature more than ever and expressed this in our meetings and in our work. We knew we wanted to meet more often, so we've gathered on Zoom monthly (and in the Summer ONCE at Sue's home - which was so special!). Zoom enables us to see and hear each other on the 'gallery 'view and share ideas, questions, works in progress and try out different prompts and styles.

From the start, (when 'Covid 19 'wasn't a word we knew, just a 'nasty virus'), through the ugly truth of desperation, separation, death, depression and restriction and on to signs of a more hopeful future, the writers produced a wealth of poems, prayers, reflections and memoirs which have stirred and comforted a wide audience. Confidence has grown; healing has happened; personal and corporate faith has been assured and mental health boosted.

Our writing has been used in the Gracious Street online services, on our church Facebook page and shared widely around the district, the county, even across the world!

In September we produced a book, 'LOVE, FEAR & FAITH IN A TIME OF COVID'\*, which follows not just our experience, but wider corporate and community journeys in this unprecedented of times. Compiling and creating the book was a compelling and fulfilling task and made us realise that for some at least, we had never been so productive! It felt we were contributing to the general functioning of emotional and behavioural adjustment in uncertain times!

We'd like to thank not only those who have bought the book, but all who have commented on it, encouraged us and found the material helpful, hopeful, challenging and spiritually refreshing. Thanks too to Gordon, Ann Fox and all who have actively engaged with our writing and stimulated us to keep going. We are open to suggestions, commissions and welcome comments and ideas.

#### **Pastoral**

Last March, Rachel Watson became the Pastoral Secretary, replacing Diane Hicks when she, and Ron, went to Driffield to be acting Superintendents for a year.

A Core Pastoral Team has been formed – Gordon Hay, Rachel Watson, Dot Rodham and Vicki Taylor. As a team we come together from different areas of the church, which helps us to understand the needs of different people. Rachel oversees pastoral visitors, Dot has a focus on the senior members of the church and the housebound and Vicki oversees families. This group still needs further development, to include house groups and others areas of church life.

The fortnightly meetings are a time to come together and support each other and seek where God is leading us and needing us to be, as a group, as a whole pastoral team and as a church. We also have a WhatsApp group to raise any urgent concerns that need to be investigated.As a pastoral team we have grown together as a group over the months and we support each other in developing and carrying out this important work.

We meet together via zoom once a fortnight to discuss the pastoral care of the church family of Gracious Street. We are particularly keen to ensure that these groups feel valued, connected and supported at this particular time. During this time we have been through the pastoral lists and updated them and ensured that most of the people are now with a home group or pastoral leader, there are still a small number to be allocated.

At the moment this group is looking at the "transition period" between the present and a time when we will be able to meet together again as a church family. We have also spoken with Sue Oliver, MHA, lead for MHA Communities in Harrogate. They have only been going for a year and offer befriending, digital training and virtual coffee mornings.

Pastoral visitors continue to keep in contact with people in their groups. Some Home Groups have also continued to meet either virtually or, occasionally, face-to-face. We also established Coffee@11am. All this contact, virtual or face-to-face, has been so important in keeping people connected.

We did explore the idea of a generational ministry where families and the more senior members of our community could write letters to one another. This had some logistical complications and there was not sufficient take up of the idea. So we'd decided to put it on hold.

The Flower Team has been unable to deliver any flowers since 16th March 2020. However, we send cards out to people who have been ill, bereaved, are celebrating. This is not quite the same as a doorstep delivery of flowers but does show that the church is still thinking of them and praying for them. Joyce Hoare keeps the prayer chain up to date, but if you do hear of anyone who you think would benefit from a card, please let Rachel know (866323).

On Mothering Sunday, lat year, we quickly adapted to the new circumstances and were able to organise the delivery of flowers to all women in our community. This was greatly appreciated and was start of the development of card initiative This is a new concept trying to keep people connected. So far 4 different cards have been produced and distributed, with an Easter card and a summer card waiting. About 200 cards are delivered each time of production. This means the complete church family receives a card every time one is produced. A big "Thank You" to all those involved in every step of this project.

# Worship

### Worshipping life of Gracious Street

Throughout the last year we have continued to be a worshipping church. Online services have been on Facebook and Vimeo at 6.30 each Sunday evening. These have evolved as time has gone on and now last 20-25 minutes. In January this year new formats were introduced with fortnightly pre-recorded Sunday service at 6.30pm. Other services now start at 8pm, Sunday Night Live is an interactive service where guests reflect on scripture and how it affects our everyday life. Singing the Faith Live is a live and interactive time of story and song, looking at favourite hymns and songs and what they mean to us. The fourth Sunday is a Taize service, on Zoom, a time of peace and reflection.

Throughout October and November 2020 services were held in our Church building, with a maximum attendance of 44 plus stewards, preachers, musicians and screen operators. A booking service was in operation with capacity left for those who might just drop in on a Sunday morning. We are thankful to Gordon Smith who organised the booking system. This system worked well with maximum numbers to start with and then dropping to about 28, with a core group of people coming every week. These services had music as people came in and left, and one or two hymns on screen, but no singing allowed. We were able to say the Lord's Prayer

together and have responsive prayers. Although very different these services were appreciated and well received by those attending.

During 2020 Sue Walkington, Sharon Wright and Sue Whalley all met the required criteria for part one of the Worship Leaders and Preachers Training course. Sue Whalley continued with her studies going on to meet the criteria for part two of the course to enable her to become a Local Preacher. Sue now needs to do a final trial service and be interviewed again at a future Circuit Leaders of Worship and Local Preachers meeting.

### Advent@Home

The idea of an Advent project that could engage many of the Gracious Street Family came out of a conversation about building community during lockdown. As with many of these things it snowballed a bit and became larger than it was first intended to be but I hope that became a strength! Many years ago now, whilst on sabbatical, I made a study of 'Sacred Space' - what makes a space 'sacred' and what do we do with it when we have identified it as such. I visited many holy places from Jerusalem to Lindisfarne, The Hagia Sophia in Istanbul to Iona, Labyrinths, stone circles and many places beyond. I came to realise that sacred space can be anywhere. Although some places have a 'holy feel 'about them because of association, I became very aware that anywhere can be sacred but we are not always good at carving out that space for ourselves, especially in our homes. Over the past 12 months we have been dislocated from our traditional sacred spaces and so we thought Advent was a good starting place to introduce the idea that we can, very simply, make sacred space in our homes and, at the same time with everyone from the church family doing the same thing, build community as well. There are about 100 people on the Gracious Street Prayer Chain — Alan Middleton contacts 9 by telephone and I send emails to around 90.

Year on year we have had a reasonable flow of prayer requests with a limited number of updates. However, over the last year, since the first lockdown in March 2020 to the present, the Prayer Chain has become noticeably busier with both initial requests and subsequent updates. We've been pleased to receive messages of thanks from folk who not only feel supported by our prayers but also feel more connected to the Church family through the Prayer Chain.

During the last year we have received over 80 prayer requests for different individuals, families and situations. About 20 of these have then been updated at least once or twice and about 10

have been updated four times or more — making some of these our long term prayer concerns. Altogether that's over 200 messages. It's always good to hear how God is answering our prayers as that encourages us to keep on praying.

Alan Middleton and I are happy to continue contacting folk by telephone and email but Marion King, having been involved with the Prayer Chain for many years, is no longer able to help.

### Task Force

The Re-opening taskforce was formed in July 2020. Our objective was to prepare Gracious Street so that we could reopen in a Covid-secure way.

Over the past seven months the group has invested a significant amount of time and effort in various activities:-

Assessing Government, Methodist Church, District and Circuit advice (initial and on-going).

Reviewing and tailoring the Methodist church building reopening checklist. Creating an over-arching Gracious Street Risk assessment.

Making the building Covid-secure – installation of hand sanitiser and hand towel dispensers, processes for cleaning the building, building layout.

Access to the building - one-way system, sign-ins (test and trace form, NHS Covid app). Sunday Services – limited attendance, booking process, worship area layout.

Return of internal and external groups - risk assessments for each group, policies for users of the building.

As we move out of the (hopefully) final lock-down the group are concentrating on Establishing which groups are planning to return, including reviewing risk assessments. Work out how we can safely reintroduce music (instruments and vocals). Investigate Bridge re-opening, including the serving of food and drink.

## **Management**

The work of the management team has continued throughout the lockdown with the team meeting virtually on a regular basis. Our property continues to need to be maintained with regular servicing and continuation of various maintenance contracts. I am grateful to Eleanor Borkett for the work she does overseeing the property and responding to needs as they have arisen.

The premises have been inspected weekly and the water system flushed when the building was not being used to comply regulations regarding legionella.

I am grateful to the Covid 19 task force, chaired by Steve Ainsley, for the brilliant work they did in preparing the premises for a return to worship in the Autumn. Alongside members of the Management Team, they moved, chairs set up the worship area, installed hand sanitisers, supported "track & trace" both virtually and hard copies, produced risk assessments for returning activities and reviewed those from external groups who were able to return briefly. This is not an exhaustive list but gives a flavour of the work of the task force & management team during this past year.

I would also like to thank Sue Whalley who has stepped down from Management Team after a number of years leading the Bridge team. We will miss you Sue, but we know you are concentrating on other things within the life of the Church.

We would like to broaden the Management Team as we look forward to addressing new challenges that will inevitably come our way as we emerge from the pandemic. If you are interested in joining the team please do have a word with me or Gordon

## <u>Finance</u>

The Church accounts for 2019/20 were approved by leadership team, acting on behalf of Church Council, in January following independent examination by Bulmer and Co. Overall across all funds we made a surplus of approximately £ 26,700 on the year, which was a much better outcome than seemed likely in the immediate aftermath of lockdown 1. The overall surplus was made up of a surplus of approximately £28,000 on our unrestricted funds and a small deficit of £1,300 on our restricted funds.

However, the surplus was due to 4 main exceptional items, namely a refund from our photocopying supplier from previous over charges of £12,000, donations from members of £10,400 and a reduction in our assessment of £10,000, paid in the 2019/20 financial year. The fourth element was income of just over £4,000 from Resurrected Bites.

Moving on to the current financial year, we have continued to see donations and additional offerings from members with a further £4,700 being received since 1<sup>st</sup> September making a total of £15,1700. This is a tremendous effort by members and I am extremely grateful for the generosity of all who have contributed, particularly where household budgets are under great pressure for many. I am also grateful for continued regular offerings with people getting their envelope giving to me, but also seeing a rise in the number of people paying directly into the Church's bank account by standing order. Paying in this way makes financial planning so much more straightforward when I have a much more predictable income. It also reduces cash

handling which is welcome at any time, but particularly so in reducing the risk of spreading infection.

We have also benefitted from income from resurrected bites use of the Castle room with further income of £7,000. The income from Resurrected Bites was largely as a result of grants that they were able to secure and pass on to us for the rental of the room, unfortunately these grants have dried up and therefore from February our income from Resurrected Bites will reduce to £700 per month which is still very welcome income which we would otherwise not have.

We continue to benefit from a reduction in our circuit assessment of a further £10,000, but of from February it has returned to more normal levels. Our rental income is still going to be significantly reduced, so I am forecasting that we will make a deficit of £13,000 this year. We therefore need to avoid becoming complacent with our finances and maintain our regular giving. A summary of our funds held is given in the table below.

The restrictions of the past year have pushed us to thinking of new ways of giving which include donating by text from your mobile phone, making donations online via the website or by clicking the link <a href="http://graciousstreetmethodist.mydona.com/">http://graciousstreetmethodist.mydona.com/</a>. We have installed a contactless "Collection Plate" and we have signed up to easyfundraising <a href="https://www.easyfundraising.org.uk/">https://www.easyfundraising.org.uk/</a> which makes a donation to Church funds when you shop on-line from many of the major online stores.
